Everything You Need to Know

Passes/Reciprocity

Your High Holy Day pass is a symbol of your support for Rodef Shalom Congregation. Each member household in good standing will receive a pass to attend holiday services via mail prior to the High Holy Days season. Estimated delivery is September 1. If you have questions about your membership, please leave us a message at 412-621-6566 x120 and someone will be in touch.

Members who will be out-of-town for the High Holy Days may request a reciprocity form for any Reform congregation affiliated with the URJ. Arrangements must be made in advance by contacting Barb Feige at 412-621-6566 x119.

Members of any URJ congregation may attend Rodef Shalom's services with the reciprocity form available from their congregation.

College students and members of the military are welcome as our guests without passes. Please bring your college or military ID.

Members may request passes for out-of-town family members and guests. A contribution of \$36 per ticket is suggested.

Unaffiliated individuals may request passes as well. A contribution of \$360 per ticket is suggested.

Seating

Doors to the Main Sanctuary will open 30 minutes prior to services. Ushers will be available to assist with seating.

Hearing Devices

Hearing enhancement devices are available in the Main Sanctuary. Please see an usher as you enter to receive one. If you have a T-Coil in your hearing aid, talk to your audiologist to ensure it is activated and on to receive the benefit of the hearing-aid loop in the Main Sanctuary.

Reservations required at RodefShalom.org/5784.

Childcare for children preschool age and under is available during most services. To ensure a safe environment with the appropriate number of caregivers, reservations are required. Please RSVP by Tuesday, September 5 for Rosh Hashanah and by Monday, September 11 for Yom Kippur.

Snacks will be provided. Brown bag lunches or additional snacks for your child(ren) are welcome. Parents/guardians must remain in the building.

SHANAH TOVAH

As a brand-new clergy partnership, we have enjoyed getting to know one another over the summer. We already have deep appreciation for one another's knowledge and experience, and are learning how best to agree, disagree, and to dream together. The 304,805 letters are the ones we see. They reflect the Jews who presently gain guidance, insight, and inspiration from Jewish life. Maybe you are one of that 304,805? We look forward to all of the moments we will share with you in 5784 and beyond.

The other 295,195 exist as the white spaces in between the letters. These are the ones we don't see... the lonely and the isolated, and the ones who haven't yet had their passions ignited or their imaginations captured by Jewish life and tradition, or the ones who got turned off or turned away. If this is you, please know that just as a Torah scroll is unreadable without every letter, the Jewish community is not complete without you. We are here to help you find your path to your Jewish future.

What does that future look like?

At the new Board member retreat in July, we shared a teaching by the writer Nora McInerny. Like many, McInerny has little patience for uncertainty. She relates that when as a child she would ask her father what was going to happen just as the opening credits rolled, he would respond, "Let's find out together."

What will your own Jewish life look like in 5784? Let's find out together—through services, classes, meetings, conversations in the hallways, and along life's paths.

What will this year bring for the community as a whole? Let's find out together—through active engagement, respectful discourse, and a sharing of ideas.

This is a *Shehecheyanu* moment for Rodef Shalom Congregation—a moment to acknowledge a change of season and a new era in the congregation's history. A moment of being together in new, positive, purposeful, and significant ways.

What's going to happen? Let's find out together.

May we each be blessed with good health, adventure, and sweetness in the new year.

TASHLICH is the traditional Rosh Hashanah ritual by which we symbolically cast away sins into a body of water and give ourselves a fresh start to the new year.

REVERSE TASHLICH transforms the ancient ritual to tackle the modern global issue of water pollution. Participants work together to remove potentially harmful debris from the water.

This year we will perform a clean, litter-free means by which to cast away our sins, before setting out to clean up litter from the streams and stream-beds in Frick Park. Meet in the Lower Frick Park parking lot by the soccer field ready to get dirty and maybe even a little bit wet. We will provide gloves, buckets, and snacks. All ages are welcome.



This year's Sukkot celebration begins the evening of Friday, September 29. Coming just five days after Yom Kippur concludes the solemn High Holy Days, Sukkot is a time of joy and happiness. The Hebrew word *sukkot*, the plural of *sukkah*, refers to the booths or huts in which we give thanks for the fall harvest. Each year Rodef Shalom Congregation erects an outdoor sukkah with a schedule of various opportunities for congregants to celebrate in that sukkah and observe the commandment to dwell in booths.

Sukkot commemorates God's protection of us during forty years of wandering in the wilderness after receiving the Torah on Mt. Sinai. Known as the Season of Our Rejoicing, Sukkot is the only festival associated with an explicit commandment to rejoice. With the creation of Rodef Shalom Congregation's unique and gorgeous bima sukkah, our joy is enhanced even indoors throughout the week's services and celebrations. Because the photograph below does not do justice to the beauty of the bima sukkah, make sure visit the Main Sanctuary to see it for yourself.
