


Doing More and Less. Doing More with Less.

As I write this, we are deep into "budget season". That means that each department head and the administrative and finance staff are hip-deep and rising in planning for the next fiscal and program year which starts on July 1st.

So why did I say "planning" and not "budgeting"? Because a budget is just that, a PLAN. The plan reflects what we must accomplish in the next year (religious services and education programs) and what we want to accomplish (music and arts programs). I actually enjoy doing budgets/planning. I like the minutiae, the detail, the conversations on how a budget reflects who we are as a Congregation. An organization's mission, values, and vision defines its budget. Most people think budgets are just numbers. I see the narrative below:



19% Grants

20% Contributions

- 6% ERTC/COVID Relief Program (one time payment)
- Grants and Contributions for Capital Improvements (includes security hardening)
- 5% Rental Revenue

12% Program Fees/Tuition

If we budget X dollars for congregational dinners, we can have two of those, but if we combine the dinners with a scholar-in-residence shared with the community, then we can do three!

The preschool wants to add another two-year-old class. Will the additional tuition payments cover the costs of a hiring another teacher and all support services and supplies?

Pursuer of Peace usually brings in X amount of money. How can we increase what it raises while maintaining costs? Can we skip an appetizer at the dinner? Maybe not!

Rodef Shalom Congregation has been blessed with the generosity of past generations who established endowments to ensure the future of the congregation. For the past decade or more, we have used the endowments to reduce budget deficits. We cannot continue to do that much longer. Hard decisions must be made. How do we continue our mission with *less*? Or where do we find *more*?

Member dues provide only about 35-40% of the Congregation's operating budget. See pie charts. That figure holds true for almost every synagogue—especially the brick and mortar ones; those that own buildings. Other income comes from rentals, grants, and fundraising efforts. We need to find ways to increase income from ALL sources and identify new ones.


DIRECTOR

The largest expenses, to quote our Director of Finance Amy Langham, are "people and place"—meaning personnel costs and facility maintenance and repair costs.

Our building is magnificent. It is nearly 120 years old with the last major renovations taking place about 30 years ago. Building systems have a limited lifespan. Seventy-year-old heating systems start to fail. Fifty-year-old roofs start to leak. We have hundreds of programs and events a year—our own and outside rentals. Our building is well-used, but all that use requires constant upkeep. We have made changes to building infrastructure to update to more efficient lighting and heating systems, with resulting savings in utilities costs. Yet, there is always more to do.

Our people are amazing. Our staff is incredible. We have made staff reductions—eliminating two and half positions—in order to reduce costs. This means others have to do more in order for us to maintain the level of programs and services that the Congregation desires. Bandwidth is at a premium, capacity is full, and our staff still finds ways to do more...with less.

As always, I invite your input and ideas and encourage you to volunteer and donate your time, talent, or treasure. We always have opportunities for you to participate in our Congregation. Together our community can accomplish so much more—so that we don't have to do less.

Why are we the students here? What are we doing it for? And why, exactly, do you send your children to J-JEP or any Jewish education?

These are not easy questions but they are the questions that motivate me and drive our J-JEP mission. Once upon a time, parents could just shrug about it. You signed up because that's just what you did. But over my 30 year career, that attitude is, thankfully, almost entirely gone.

Some time ago, I had a parent literally, as in, with these specific words, say to their child in front of me, "I hated it, your grandfather hated it and you'll hate it, but it's important to go." Gee, golly, didn't that make me feel good about my chosen profession! So good riddance to this sort of doleful sense of obligation that sends parents begrudgingly registering their children. However, with the loss of this sense of obligation, the raw numbers of Jewish children in religious schools are down everywhere.











The good news is that we, the teachers, need to work hard to create a program and a style that helps children feel connected and proud and, on balance, pleased to spend their Sunday mornings with us. The numbers may be down but the students have, for the most part, parents with better attitudes and more positive goals for their children.

Now J-JEP enters the free market no longer able to count on being a commodity that parents must buy. We have to compete by adding better personal connection to the fullness of Judaism, better sense of spirituality, better paths for the students to engage their souls, better instruction, better grasp of basic facts and customs, and more meaningful moments.

We are getting there. Our oldest grades took on leadership with a variety of project based learning units. The *chugim* program brings novelty and a different point of view to the students' heritage. This spring and summer J-JEP's curriculum will be getting a complete review.

So, after all the that, can we answer the questions, "Why are we here? What are we doing it for?" J-JEP exists to bring deep and meaningful personal, soul touching knowledge and understanding of our heritage. We do that to have our students be smart and proud members of the Jewish people who can use their connection to our heritage to make the world a better place and make themselves better people.







Summer Reads

It is amazing to believe we are halfway through 2023 and have reached the summer, but here we are again at warm weather, pool and vacation season. Here at the Lippman Library, we have books to satisfy various interests, whether they be an interest in reading up on summer Jewish holidays, or just a good fiction book for summer reading. The following are four books available in the Lippman Library, three for adults and one for children.

A Summer World

by Stefan Kanfer

For adults, this fascinating book presents an historical overview of the most prominent American Jewish summer vacation spot from years past: the Catskill Mountain retreat in Upstate New York. The book describes the genesis of the resort, how it grew into what it became, and ultimately its demise by the 1970s. Though an older book, it holds up well and remains an enjoyable read about the effervescent atmosphere that made up this Jewish summer retreat.

Morningside Heights

by Joshua Henkin

This newer release, published in 2021, takes place in 1976 and the early 2000s. A love story filled with obstacles, the book concerns an Ohio-born Jewish woman who falls in love with and marries her college professor, who later develops Alzheimer's. While the book is based on a serious subject, it is about compassion and what it means to hold a family together through both good and bad. The author was a finalist for the 2012 National Jewish Book Award.

Celebrating the Jewish Year: the Spring and Summer Holidays

This book discusses the origins of and provides various readings connected with the spring and summer holidays of Passover, Shavuot, and Tisha b'Av. While Passover is behind us and Shavuot comes up very early in the summer season, it is always permissible to revisit these two holidays. However the main section of the book that pertains to the summer season is Tisha b'Av, which this year comes in late July. One of the most serious and solemn days in the Jewish calendar, this section appropriately includes poignant readings and commentary reflection.

Camp Winderful Wild

This cute book for young children discusses the thrills of a Jewish summer camp, from outdoor sing-a-longs to bonfires and s'mores. With only a few words per page, it is the hilarious and clever pictures that tell most of the story.

FROM THE ARCHIVES



Who's in the Archives? Maybe you!

If you are affiliated with Rodef Shalom, chances are that you or someone in your family is represented in our congregational archives. There can be gaps in the records, because what we have now depends on what was saved in the past, but what we have—at least 270 boxes and counting—can highlight individual stories as well as give us an overall sense of the congregation's history. These archival records are used for a wide variety of purposes, both in-house and in the wider community.

Bob Rosenthal (for the Building Committee) or Dave Seskey (Building Superintendent) may ask to see original architectural drawings of different parts of our building as they work to maintain our beautiful historic structure. Other staff members and congregants may be looking for old photos to use in a display or article commemorating an important anniversary or other event. A careful reading of sermons by our past rabbis can reveal what was going on in Pittsburgh and the world and how Rodef Shalom responded to those events.

The largest category of requests, by far, is for information about family history. These questions come from current congregants and by email from all over the country. I will always try to find answers for these researchers if I can, and I usually also have some suggestions for other resources they can consult. The immense popularity of genealogy as a hobby is an indicator that people want to learn about history, and the history of their own families makes for an irresistibly personal hook into the past.

And there are also usually a few academic researchers independent scholars who come in to the Archives with a very specific focus. An education professor at the University of Rochester is writing a book about education in the United States, beginning with her own experience as a student in our Preschool, which was then called the Temple Nursery School. An architecture professor at Pitt is studying, in minute detail, the story of the construction of our sanctuary in 1906-1907, right down to the types of nails that were used (and yes, he found that information in our archives). After a of couple years email correspondence, a researcher from Maryland recently visited in person to take pictures of and exchange information about the five portraits in our art collection that were painted by his grandfather.
